Namgyal was my introduction to Khotang, the district in which we work; ever since my initial trip to Khotang we worked hand-in-hand. We truly became brothers. I credit Namgyal with changing my life when he first asked me to come to Khotang. To say he will be missed is an understatement. We will continue to work in his memory. A *chorten* (Buddhist monument) has been commissioned to be built on Namgyal's favorite site above the villages where we work and where he grew up.
